Les Vignobles Dauriac, Propriétés de Christian Dauriac, regroupent le Château Destieux, Grand Cru Classé de Saint-Emilion, le Château Montlisse, Grand Cru de Saint-Emilion et le château La Clémence en Pomerol.

Wine is a Dauriac family tradition. The Château Destieux was bought by Mrs Dauriac, Christian Dauriac's mother, the current vineyards owner. Christian Dauriac, with a double degree in medical biology and oenology has always tried to combine his two passions in life; wine and biology.

Following his friend Michel Rolland expert advice, he expanded the family vineyard by buying the Château Montlisse in 1984, Grand Cru in Saint Emilion, raising the standard within the wine market. Its wines were recently ranked 'Amazing' by the supermarket E.Leclerc during their annual blind-tasting, something to look for at all wine fairs.

In 1996, Christian Dauriac purchases the Château La Clémence. Top-tier wine produced in a limited quantity of about 500 to 600 cases per year. The Château La Clémence has already begun making a name for itself and on several occasions, its quality has been recognized by professionals.

STARRING...

CHRISTIAN DAURIAC



The story began in 1971, when Mrs Dauriac, Christian's mother, purchased Château Destieux in Saint-Emilion, At that time Christian worked as a hospital intern, but at the same time attended oenology and ampelology courses. At that time he met his friend Michel Rolland, with whom he would later work.

In 1976, at his mother's request, he produces wine Destieux for the very first time. It was quite a revelation for this biologist destined for a bright medical career.

In order to combine his two passions, he decided to settle in 1997 in Castillon –La -Bataille and at the same time to manage several medical analyses laboratories.

Christian Dauriac is a wine lover at heart and his scientific capabilities are put to good use by the technical nature of viticulture and wine production.

If the challenge was to make good wine Christian Dauriac has succeeded in all his undertakings. Indeed in 2006, Château Destieux was promoted Grand Cru Classé. This prestigious recognition felt just like a reward for this hard work.

Today, Christian Dauriac carries on working passionately, not only at Château Destieux but also at Château Montlisse in Saint-Emilion, purchased in 1984, and at Château La Clémence in Pomerol, purchased in 1996. Today, these three properties carry the Dauriac name.

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
